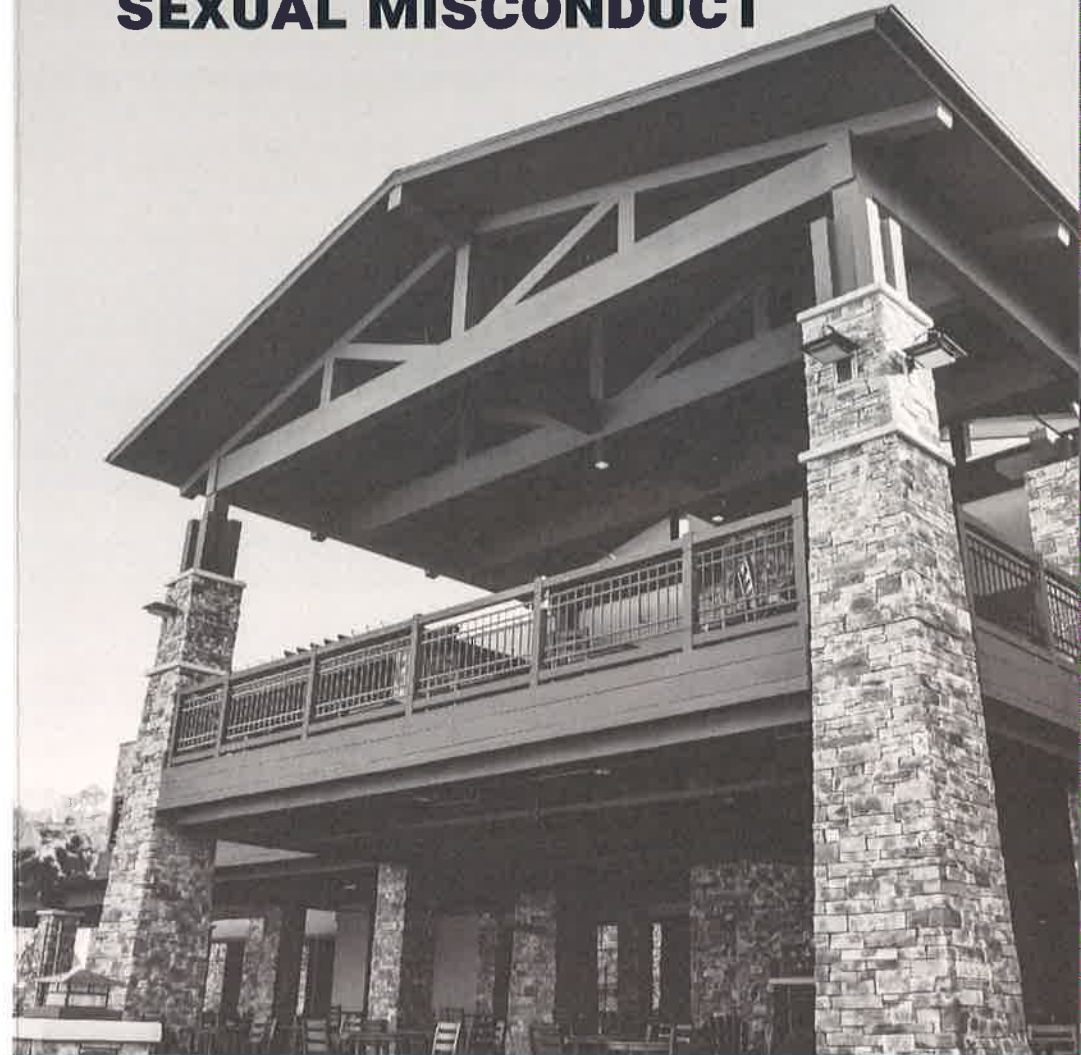

Appendix V: Policy for Sexual Misconduct

RESPONDING TO SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

The Master's University is committed to fostering holiness in the lives of our students, faculty, and staff. This includes issues of sexuality. Scripture is clear that any sexual activity outside of marriage between a man and a woman is sin and not to be pursued. Students who engage in sexual activity, even consensually, outside the bonds of marriage, are acting in a manner that violates student conduct standards as described in the student handbook in conjunction with the doctrinal statement of The Master's University. When a member of our community sexually violates another, the university is committed to pursuing investigation and disciplinary actions according to Title IX regulations.

WHAT IS TITLE IX?

Title IX of the Education Amendment of 1972 is a federal law which prohibits all forms of discrimination on the basis of sex including sexual misconduct in programs and activities of the university. As stated in T34 C.F.R. Part 106 and its implementing regulation, "no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

WHAT IS SEXUAL MISCONDUCT?

Sexual misconduct is unwelcome verbal, non-verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature that includes but is not limited to: sexual harassment, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking. Sexual misconduct occurs without consent or takes place with an individual incapable of giving consent and may include physical force, coercion, threat or intimidation.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I AM SEXUALLY ASSAULTED?

- Get to a safe place, call 911 and contact a trusted friend.
- Do not shower, bathe, or change your clothes.
- Go to a hospital for medical care where you will be given a specialized physical exam.
- Medical professionals are required to notify the police but the decision to make a formal police report is still yours.
- If you decide not to go to the police immediately, write down all the details of the assault (who, what, when, where, why and how) and keep them in case you wish to file a report later.
- For ongoing care and support, contact a Student Life Resident Director and/or Associate Dean of Students.

BYSTANDER INTERVENTION

A bystander is someone who sees an individual at risk for sexual misconduct and takes steps to positively intervene to prevent it. This includes recognizing situations of potential harm, understanding cultural conditions that facilitate violence, overcoming barriers to intervening, identifying safe and effective intervention options and taking action to intervene.

The Student Handbook describes safe and positive options that may be carried out by an individual or individuals to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of sexual misconduct.

These bystander intervention steps are:

- Recognize when to intervene.
- Consider whether the situation needs attention.
- Decide if there is a responsibility to act.
- Take action.

REPORTING SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

University employees are required to report all details of a sexual misconduct incident including the identities of all parties involved to the Title IX Administrator or Deputy Coordinators so that immediate action can be taken to prevent, protect, and correct the causes of sexual misconduct. Any acts of retaliation for reporting an incident or participating in an investigation will not be tolerated.
