# Fall 2024 Student Enrollment Report



March 2025

This document aims to provide a comprehensive report on the student enrollment at The Master's University and Seminary (TMUS) for the Fall 2024 semester. While the University's traditional undergraduate program (TRAD) is the primary focus, the report also includes sections that present enrollment characteristics for TMU's graduate programs, and The Master's Seminary (TMS). The report includes the student enrollment funnel and two new sections covering First Generation Students and Student Athletes.

### **Institutional Overview**

The information in this report represents student enrollment at TMUS as of our official fall "census" date— October 15, 2024—unless specifically noted otherwise. For most programs this corresponds to the Fall 2024 semester. The first table (A1) provides a detailed breakdown of the Fall 2024 unduplicated student headcount at TMUS across different programs, genders, ethnicities, and full-time equivalent students. Let us analyze the key aspects:

#### Trend Analysis (Figure A2).

This is an eight-year analysis of programs at TMUS.

#### **Certificate and Non-degree Programs:**

- TMU ASAP: The headcount has increased steadily over the years, more than doubling from 2016 to 2024.
- TMU Online Non-Matric (OLP, HSON): The headcount has consistently grown, with a significant increase from 2018 to 2024.
- Total Certificate and Non-degree Programs: There is a general upward trend, indicating growth in these programs.

#### **Baccalaureate Degree Programs:**

- TMU Traditional BA/BS/BM: The headcount has seen some fluctuations but has increased, with a noticeable jump in 2021 and 2022.
- TMU OLP BA: A consistent upward trend, with a substantial increase from 2018 to 2024.
- TMS B.Th.: Fluctuations, but a slight overall decrease in headcount.
- Total Baccalaureate Programs: Overall growth, with a significant increase in recent years.

### **Master's Degree Programs:**

- M.Div. (Master of Divinity): A consistent increase in headcount.
- MBA (OLP): A steady rise in headcount.
- Total Master's Programs: Overall growth, with fluctuations in certain programs.

### **Doctoral Degree Programs:**

- D. Min. (Doctor of Ministry): Fluctuations, but the headcount has remained stable.
- Ph.D.: A general increase in headcount, particularly in recent years.
- Total Doctoral Programs: Some variability, but overall, the headcount has shown modest growth.

### **Total Fall Student Enrollment (TMUS):**

- The combined headcount for TMU and TMS has consistently increased over the years, reaching its highest point in 2024.
- In summary, the institution has experienced growth in total student enrollment over the nine-year period, with varying trends in different academic programs. The recent years, particularly 2021 and 2022, seem to show substantial growth in several programs. Further analysis could involve identifying factors contributing to these trends and exploring potential correlations with external factors such as economic conditions or changes in educational policies.

# B. TMU Traditional Undergraduate Program (TRAD)

As of October 15<sup>th</sup>, there were a total of 1207 students enrolled for credit in TMU traditional baccalaureate degree programs. **Figure B1** summarizes this student group by class and enrollment status.

This fall's student group includes 236 first-time freshmen (FTF) students which is the cohort of individuals traditionally used by the federal government as the basis for calculating student retention and graduation rates. As can be seen in **Figure B1**, 26 of the FTF students are not in fact still freshmen. This is a consequence of these students taking advanced placement and dual enrollment courses during high school to have at least 30 (or 60) semester units of transfer credit to be classified as sophomores or juniors.

# **Key Observations:**

- Freshman Class: The largest group is First-Time Freshmen (210), followed by Transfers (76), and a small number of Continuing students (46).
- **Sophomore to Senior**: The majority of students in these classes are Continuing students, indicating strong retention or progression.
- Transfers: Most transfers are in the Freshman and Sophomore years, with very few in the Senior year.
- Overall Enrollment: The total number of students is 1,207, with the largest class being Seniors (301) and the smallest being Juniors (284).

**Figure B2** presents the gender distribution of traditional undergraduate students at TMU. Over time, the percentage of female students in the traditional student body has increased. Historically, TMU has enrolled equal numbers of male and female students. Despite this trend, we have a more balanced gender proportion than the national average of 60% male and 40% female. Our greater enrollment of males is due to strong enrollment in Biblical Studies.

#### **Key Insights:**

- Gender Balance: The student body is nearly evenly split, with 51% female and 49% male.
- Freshman Class: Slightly more females (169) than males (159).
- Junior Class: Males outnumber females (152 vs. 132), which is the only class where this occurs.

- **Senior Class**: Females again outnumber males (168 vs. 137), suggesting stronger retention or progression among female students.
- **Overall Enrollment**: Matches the total from the previous table (1,207 students), confirming consistency across datasets.

**Figure B3** summarizes the ethnic distribution of Fall 2024 TRAD students, while **Figure B4** presents the ethnic distribution of TMU TRAD students over the past ten years. **Figure B4** shows the ten-year trend of ethnicity enrollment for traditional undergraduate programs at TMU. The total number of enrolled students has been increasing over the years, with 1207 students enrolled in Fall 2024. The percentage of white students has been decreasing over the years, from 64% in 2014 to 60% in 2024. On the other hand, the percentage of non-white students has been increasing over the years, from 36% in Fall 2014 to 39.8% in Fall 2024. Hispanic students continue to grow as a proportion of the student body. We are close to being eligible for HSI (Hispanic Serving Institution) designation.

# Key Insights:

- Majority Group: White students make up the majority at 55.5%.
- Largest Minority Group: Hispanic/Latino students represent 20.9%, a significant portion of the student body.
- Diversity: The remaining 23.6% is distributed among various ethnic groups, with Asians (7.6%) and students of Two or More Races (4.0%) being the next largest.
- Unknown/Unreported: A notable 5.4% of students did not report their race/ethnicity.

# **Key Insights:**

- White students consistently make up about two-thirds of the student population, with a slight downward trend from 67.9% to 67.2%.
- Non-White enrollment has remained relatively stable, hovering around 32–34%.
- **Black or African American students** represent the largest non-White group, though their numbers have gradually declined.
- Hispanic/Latino and Asian students show small but steady representation.
- Minimal representation from Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and American Indian/Alaska Native groups.

As can be seen in **Figure B6**, many students in TMU's traditional undergraduate degree programs are in the 18 – 22 age brackets (over 90%). The average age of all TRAD students is 20.

- The **majority of students (68.1%)** are between the ages of **18 and 20**, which aligns with traditional undergraduate age expectations.
- Age 19 has the highest enrollment (24.4%), followed closely by age 20 (23.7%).
- A small portion (1.9%) are **under 18**, likely early college entrants or dual-enrollment students.
- Age 21 still represents a significant portion (17.1%).

Figure B7 illustrates that many TRAD students were enrolled on a full-time basis during the Fall 2024 semester. The figure also shows the calculation of Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) students in TMU's TRAD programs. It should be noted that there are two ways that are typically used to calculate student FTE. For Federal reporting purposes, FTE is calculated based on the number of full-time students (12 units or more) plus roughly one-third of the part-time students. Using this approach, TMU had 1,196 FTE TRAD Fall 2024 students. Another method (Figure B8) that is often used to determine FTE is to take the total number of units sold during the semester and divide it by what is considered the average full-time student load of 15 units. With this method, there were 1,244 FTE Fall 2024 TRAD students. This larger number is due to the greater enrollment of full-time students.

- The unit-based method yields a higher FTE because it captures the actual academic load, not just enrollment
- The **difference (48 students)** suggests that full-time students are, on average, taking slightly more than the baseline 15 units.

**Figure B9** (next page) summarizes the Fall 2024 TRAD program student enrollment by major and emphasis. This figure also identifies when students declared a second emphasis within their same major, or a second major in a different department. New programs (Agribusiness, Criminal Justice, Entrepreneurship) will continue to drive growth. Caution should be used in analyzing this data as students regularly change their majors/emphases.

**Figure B10** illustrates the distribution of undergraduate majors for new and continuing students. The number and proportion of students in TRAD majors are influenced by several factors, including new student recruitment, retention, inter-department transfer of continuing students, and size of the graduating class in the major. Majors tend to fluctuate within a percentage range due to these factors. The proportion of new students in each major can provide insight into the most current trends in the demand for various majors. Although there are few undeclared students, it is more likely to be due to admission staff than actual student intent. Normally, 10% of new students are undeclared. It is important to note that many new students change their majors after enrollment.

**Figure B11** shows the proportion of students in each major for the past six years. Most departments have maintained their percentage of students. Recent programs will add to overall growth. Entrepreneurship has shown strong growth.

# C. TMU On-Campus Graduate Programs

TMU offers two post-baccalaureate programs in an on-campus or mixed modality format. The University's Teacher Education department offers a fifth-year Teacher Credential (CRED) program leading to a California multiple- or single-subject teaching credential. TMU also offers a MA program in Biblical Counseling (MABC). This program operates year-round, in a "three-semester" format with some coursework being taught on-campus while other courses are taken in an online format. Fall 23 saw the enrollment of the first cohort of DMin in Biblical Studies.

**Figure C1** presents a summary of Fall 2024 semester student enrollment in the on-campus graduate programs broken down by degree and student status. While most students in the MABC programs are continuing from the prior academic year, all the students enrolled in the credential program began in Fall 2024. This is since this program is structured to be completed by the student in one academic year.

**Figure C2** shows the distribution of on-campus graduate program students by gender. The CRED and MABC programs tend to have more female students.

This is in preparation for student teaching typically during the spring semester. MABC students typically take fewer unit loads over a greater number of semesters to complete their degree programs. The result of these differing enrollment strategies is seen in **Figure C6** which presents the FTE student calculation for each of these three programs.

# D. The Master's Seminary Programs

The Master's Seminary (TMS) offers seven programs at different degree levels. At the undergraduate level, TMS offers a non-degree Diploma in Theology (Dip.Th.) and the Bachelor of Theology (B.Th.). At the master's degree level in Spanish, TMS offers a Master of Divinity (M.Div.), Master of Theology (Th.M.), and Master of Biblical Ministry (MMB). At the doctoral degree level, TMS offers the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and Doctor of Ministry (D. Min.) programs. In the 2024-2024 academic year, TMS experienced a growth of 6% despite many seminaries in the United States experiencing enrollment shortfalls on average of 3%. The growth can be attributed to the opportunity to take M.Div. courses in an online format and continued interest in the B.Th. program. Enrollment headcounts by program and student type are presented in **Figure D1**, while **Figure D2** shows the student distribution by site/population.

# **E. TMU Online Programs**

TMU Online, formerly known as DEEP, was launched in Fall 2007 with only two online courses. As of September 2024, TMU Online (OLP) has expanded its offerings to include 180+ courses, thirteen bachelor's degree programs, and five graduate programs. TMU Online also offers dual enrollment courses for high school students via online, on campus, and high school partnerships.

TMU Online courses are scheduled in 6 eight-week blocks through each calendar year, which are grouped into three terms (Fall, Spring, and Summer). The term structure for OLP mirrors the term structure of TMU's traditional oncampus programs.

OLP students tend to be male, white, and older than traditional students. While the non-matric program has the largest enrollment overall, the biggest programs are Biblical Studies and Biblical Counseling.

**Figure E1** shows a breakdown by state of OLP students as of F23. As with the Trad program, most students live in California with notable groups from Washington, Texas, and Florida.

As can be seen in Figure E4, TMU's online degree programs seem to attract a much higher percentage of men than women (55% to 45%). The ethnic distribution of online students is like that of TMU's traditional programs. TMU Online has been purposefully marketed to individuals who are at least 23 years of age to minimize competition with TMU's residential undergraduate programs. As a result, the average age of a student in OLP is 27 compared with 20.3 in the Trad program.
